


Life After WU: Alumni Spotlight

On June 16, Winthrop Interim President George Hynd and Rock Hill Schools Superintendent Bill Cook signed a Memorandum of Agreement that will allow high school students to take advanced courses in Spanish and French while simultaneously earning high school and college credit. The signing event was held at the Little Chapel on Winthrop's campus, and featured remarks from students who intend to enroll in the program.

Students and Faculty in the News

McKenzie Bennett has been selected as the recipient of a 2021 National Science Foundation (NSF) Graduate Research Fellowship Program (GRFP) fellowship to continue her studies surrounding voting rights for marginalized groups. Bennett is from Rock Hill, South Carolina, and is one of only six



social science – public policy recipients chosen in the country for the prestigious fellowship. Bennett graduated in May with a political science major and a psychology minor and will seek a Ph.D. in political science at the University of Notre Dame.

Clara Benson, a psychology major from Charleston, South Carolina, created the nonprofit Community Resources for Enduring Wellness (CREW) in June 2020 out of a need for accessible, equitable and welcoming public health resources within underserved communities in South Carolina. Shortly after



founding the nonprofit, Benson received a \$40,000 grant from the Southern Power Fund through the Highlander Research and Education Center. CREW's first major and ongoing initiative is the <u>Black Wellness Project</u>, an online resource for people to find Black health and wellness professionals across the state.

In addition, SC-NASW named **Anthony Hill**, chair of the Department of Social Work, as their Social Worker of the Year. Hill joined the Winthrop community in 2018, and his research areas include adolescent risk and resilience and financial social work.

Elizabeth Weikle, adjunct faculty in the Department of Human Nutrition, was confirmed this spring by the S.C. Medical Affairs Committee as a member of the S.C. Panel for Dietetics.
