Developmental Domain or Topic	Areas of Focus	What you need to know
Physical Development	Fine/gross motor skills, prenatal development patterns, growth and movement patterns, health issues, and the teratogens.	Focus on the age group of your students (e.g. elementary) with a general understanding of the patterns of physical development.
Cognitive/Language Development	Information processing model, attention, Piaget's stages, Vygotsky (ZPD, 4 areas of development), and executive functioning.	You should be able to cite some of the major ideas from the cognitive development theories.
Social Emotional Development	Moral development (Kohlberg, Gilligan), discipline styles, emotional intelligences, and Erikson's stages.	Again, you should be able to cite the major researchers in this area AND apply their conceptualizations to the concept of poverty and its effect on your students.
Development and the Effect of Poverty	The achievement gap/education debt. How poverty affects literacy and social skills.	Although there will be a discussion of poverty throughout the above areas, this module will specifically address poverty's affect in certain academic areas.
Focusing on Assets of Students in Poverty	Jensen's (2009) SHARE model and Resilience theory.	Think about the ways students are able to overcome some of the many issues related to poverty through resilience. Understand the concept and be able to cite several ways this occurs.
The Context of Poverty	The Learner Report assessment (from EDCO 200 and Jensen, 2009)	Finally, how can you use all this in your practice. One way is to use the SHARE model. A link to the user's guide for the SHARE model is provided.
