

The Magic Flute An Opera in Two Acts Libretto by Emanuel Schikaneder Music by Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart

SYNOPSIS

Act 1

Three Ladies in the service of the Queen of the Night create a diversion to trick Tamino into believing that they have saved him from certain death (*Zu Hülfe, zu hülfe!*) and then leave to tell the Queen what has happened. Papageno, bird photographer to the Queen, appears on the scene and introduces himself to Tamino (*Der Vogelfänger bin ich ja*). The ladies return to show Tamino a photograph of the Queen's lovely daughter, Pamina, who they promise will be his if he agrees to take the side of the Queen against the evil Sarastro. One look is enough for the young man to fall hopelessly in love (*Dies Bildnis ist bezaubernd schön*). The Queen then magically appears and tells Tamino about the cruel loss of her daughter Pamina; she enlists him to rescue her (*Oh Zittere nicht mein lieber Sohn*). The ladies give a magic flute to Tamino and a magical music machine to Papageno. They also appoint Three Spirits to guide them. Papageno's mouth is locked shut by the Three Ladies for talking too much (*Hm! hm! hm! hm!*).

Sarastro's evil Information Technology Director, Monastatos, pursues Pamina (*Du feines Täubchen, nun herein!*) but is interrupted by Papageno's arrival. Papageno reassures her of Tamino's devotion, she tells him he will one day surely have his Papagena and they go on to speak together of love and companionship between man and woman (*Bei Männern welche Liebe fühlen*). Led by the Three Spirits to the Temple of Wisdom, Tamino is advised by a mysterious old priest that it is the Queen, rather than Sarastro, who shouldn't be trusted. Hearing that Pamina is safe, Tamino sings and plays his flute, then rushes to follow the sound of Papageno's magical music machine. Monastatos and his team of geeks chase and capture Papageno and Pamina, but are rendered helpless by the machine.

Sarastro, entering in great ceremony (*Es lebe Sarastro*), promises Pamina eventual freedom and dismisses Monastatos. Pamina is enchanted by a glimpse of Tamino, who is led into the temple with Papageno.

Act 2

Sarastro tells his priests and followers that Tamino will undergo initiation rites (*O Isis und Osiris*). Monastatos tries to kiss the sleeping Pamina (*Alles fühlt der Liebe Freuden*). He is discovered and chased away by the Queen of the Night. She gives her daughter a dagger and attempts to terrify her into agreeing to murder Sarastro (*Der Hölle Rache kocht in meinem Herzen*).

The weeping Pamina is consoled by Sarastro (*In diesen heil'gen Hallen*). Tamino and Papageno are told by a priest that they must remain silent - a vow Papageno immediately breaks when he takes a glass of water from a flirtatious old hag and then engages in lighthearted chitchat with her. Just as she is about to reveal her name, she vanishes. The Three Spirits appear to guide Tamino through the rest of his journey and caution Papageno to be quiet. Tamino remains silent even when Pamina appears, which breaks her heart since she cannot understand his cold silence (*Ach, ich fühl's, es ist verschwunden*).

The priests inform Tamino that he has only two more trials to complete his initiation (*Soll ich dich, Teurer, nicht mehr sehn?*). Papageno longs for a cute wife, but when the old hag reappears, pragmatically settles for whatever he can get rather than risk being left with no one at all. When he swears to be faithful to the old hag she turns into an adorable young Papagena. They are about to embrace when she is abruptly snatched away.

After many dangers, Pamina and Tamino are brought together to face the ordeals of water and fire. They are protected by the Magic Flute.

Papageno loses hope that he will ever have his heart's desire, and has to be saved from attempted suicide by the Three Spirits who remind him that if he uses his magical music machine, he will find true happiness. When he does this, Papagena appears and the two plan a blissful future together (*Pa-pa-pa...*). The Queen of the Night, her Three Ladies, and Monastatos try to attack the temple (*Nur stille, stille*) but are defeated. Sarastro joins Pamina and Tamino, himself reuniting with the now repentant Queen. All has finally been made whole; the people hail Isis, Osiris, and the triumph of courage and wisdom.

Program Notes

Magic Flute was completed by Mozart only a few months before his death and premiered at Vienna's Freihaus Theater auf der Wieden on September 30, 1791, with a libretto by Emanuel Schikaneder. Written as *Singspiel*, a popular style which included both singing and spoken dialogue, Magic Flute was the composer's first operatic venture into commercial theater and thus was geared very much toward a rowdy public audience who were not slow to express an opinion. Mozart himself conducted and the roles of Papageno and the Queen of the Night were sung respectively by Schikanaeder and Mozart's sister-in-law Josepha Hofer.

Mozart and Schikaneder were members of the same Masonic Lodge, and although The Magic Flute is essentially pure fantasy, much of the piece may be recognized as an allegory for those rites and beliefs. The number three is said to hold mystical significance for Freemasonry and the evening begins with a brilliantly written overture in which the orchestra proclaims each of the three notes of the tonic triad. The key of E-flat major, with its key signature of three flats, features prominently throughout the score and there are numerous other references in both text and libretto.

The Magic Flute was originally set in Egypt and is traditionally often performed in a Baroque setting. Winthrop Opera Theatre's production has been adapted and updated to the present day and takes place on the beautiful campus of Winthrop University.
