Sandra Neels toured the world as a performer with the Merce Cunningham Dance Company for ten years. She has taught at USF Tampa, York University in Toronto, Hampshire College (where she was the Chair of Dance), the California Institute of the Arts, the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, UNC Greensboro (guest artist), the South Carolina Governor's School for the Arts, and Ballet Spartanburg. She has choreographed more than 150 works in a variety of settings, including musicals, operas, children's theatre, universities and arts institutes, competitions at the YAGP, fashion shows, rhythmic gymnastics, and figure skating. She has become a reconstructor/restager for the Cunningham Trust since 2003, reconstructing eight of Mr. Cunningham's works. She recently received a grant from the Trust to document The Evolution of the Cunningham Technique.



Gabrielle A. Tull is an assistant professor of dance and program coordinator for dance education at Winthrop University. She is a 2020 M.F.A. dance graduate from UNC Greensboro. As a previous high school dance director, she received a M.Ed. in divergent learning at Columbia College, South Carolina. Artistically, she has performed and collaborated with professional companies and artists including BJ Sullivan, Janet Lilly, Brian Sanders, City Modern Ensemble, The Power Company, Argentine Tango Troupe, and Terrance Henderson. Her recent scholarship in the Afro Diaspora foundations in jazz was awarded the Artist Express Grant, funded by the VCA and the NEA. Additionally, she was a lead presenter for the 2022 Collegium for African Diaspora at Duke University. Additionally in 2022-23, Gabrielle was a lead presenter at the ACDA southeastern regional, NDEO national, and SCDA state conferences.



Meg Schriffen '00, dance program director at Winthrop University, holds a B.A. in dance education from Winthrop University and an M.F.A. in performance and choreography from Florida State University. She was a member of Charlotte-based dance company, Caroline Calouche and Company. Credits include performing and choreographing for the American College Dance Association, The Charlotte Dance Festival, Florida Dance Festival, Staibdance Summer Intensive, and several Piccolo Spoleto Festivals. Meg was on faculty for Staibdance Summer Intensive in Sorrento, Italy, teaching, choreographing and performing with Staibdance. She most recently was a member of Bodiography Contemporary Ballet Charlotte and performed periodically in Charlotte and Pittsburgh. She is also certified in Bodiography Fitness and Strength Training designed for dancers, and has completed her 200-hour yoga teacher certification. Meg is in her 16th year of teaching at Winthrop.



Serena Connelly '21 is a Winthrop dance alumna with a B.A. in dance. During her time at Winthrop she has performed in faculty, student, and guest artist works, as well as dancing with The Wanda Project. Janet Gray, a native Texan, received a B.A. in plan II interdisciplinary studies honors Program with a concentration in European history and dramatic literature from the University of Texas at Austin. While working at an "entry level" position in the Houston corporate world she became interested in the theatre. returned to school to take some classes, and never looked back. Five years later she had completed both a B.F.A. in theatre from Stephen F. Austin State University, Nacogdoches, Texas, and an M.F.A. in costume and set design from Tulane University, New Orleans, Louisiana. Gray served as resident set and costume designer at New Stage Theatre in Jackson, Mississippi for ten seasons where she designed costumes and scenery for more than 100 productions. She also taught costuming for two years in the Theatre Department at what is now Truman State University in Kirksville, Missouri. She has designed costumes and scenery for professional theatres and university theatre departments in North and South Carolina, Missouri, Mississippi and Louisiana. Since 2000, Gray has spent her summers as a Costume Designer for The Flat Rock Playhouse, the State Theatre of North Carolina. Over the years she has designed and created costumes for a number of their large musicals and other seasonal productions as well as for several of their YouTheatre productions. Gray has been on the Winthrop faculty since 1998. She has received five Meritorious Achievement Awards from the Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival (KCACTF) for her work here. In 2009 she, along with the rest of the production team, received a Winthrop University Presidential Citation for her work on "Anything Goes." Gray was the 2010 recipient of the Kinard Award for Excellence in Teaching, and received the 2011 Educator of the Year Award (Winthrop University) from the York County Regional Chamber of Commerce and the Rock Hill Area Council.
