Kelly Ozust, associate professor is an educator, choreographer, and performer with a focus on narrative storytelling and community engagement. In the Department of Theatre and Dance she teaches modern, jazz, tap, and musical theatre techniques, as well as courses in choreography, dance education, and dance theory. She works closely with the musical theatre concentration by choreographing for the annual musicals, choreographing for the musical theatre workshop course, and teaching musical theatre history. She choreographs for the faculty concerts annually and directs the Winthrop Christmasville RockHettes each fall. She has taught master classes and shown work at Piedmont University (Demorest, Georgia) Colorado State University (Fort Collings, Colorado), Lindenwood University (Saint Charles, Missouri), and Greensboro Fringe Festival (Greensboro, North Carolina). She is also on faculty at the DanceWV festival (Weston, West Virginia). She has performed throughout the Southeast and danced with Van Dyke Dance Group and Sarah Council Dance Projects. Kelly is an award-winning filmmaker with projects that have been shown at the Georgia Museum of Art and the ACDA Screendance Gala. She is interested in the narrative possibilities of the body and uses her training in dance and theatre to create unique works that often explore historical people, events, and places.

Meg Schriffen '00, has been the dance program director at Winthrop since 2013, and a faculty member since 2007. She earned her Bachelor of Arts in dance with K-12 certification from Winthrop in 2000, and earned her Master of Fine Arts in performance and choreography from Florida State University in 2007. Before beginning her career at Winthrop, Meg taught dance at Camden Elementary of the Arts, in Camden, South Carolina, and then at Thomas Sumter Academy, in Dalzell, South Carolina. Meg has taught 45 different courses at Winthrop including teaching for the theatre and dance department, the College of Education, and University College in ACAD and HMXP. In that time, Meg has choreographed for every Winthrop Dance Theatre, Fall Dance Showcase, and for several Spring Dance Showcases. She also has directed all faculty and quest artist dance concerts since 2013. She choreographed works for the Winthrop Dance Repertory Theatre Traveling ensemble and the Christmasville Rockhettes, and directed many junior and senior dance productions through the years. Her choreography has been selected to be performed at the prestigious American College Dance Association multiple times, and has been performed throughout the Southeast and in Italy. Schriffen has been a performing member of several dance companies including, The Power Company, Caroline Calouche and Company, and Bodiography Contemporary Ballet Charlotte. She has been commissioned to set work on other college programs and professional dance companies including Coker College, La Roche College, and Bodiography Contemporary Ballet. She has also served and chaired numerous committees in her department, college, and for the university. She has also served on the board of the American College Dance Association. Meg was on faculty for the Staibdance Summer Dance Intensive in Sorrento, Italy, teaching, choreographing and performing with the Staibdance Company. She is also certified in Bodiography Fitness and Strength Training system designed for dancers, and has completed her 200-hour yoga teacher certification. In late December, Meg will be leaving Winthrop and stepping into a new role as the Children and Family Ministry Director at All Saints Anglican church in Weddington, North Carolina. She will miss her Winthrop family, but looks forward to seeing how the dance program continues to grow and flourish through the years, as well as coming back to visit.
