## Rules Committee Report-Vote on Bylaw Changes reviewed 4/22/22

1. Make the Academic Freedom, Tenure, & Promotion and Personnel Committess mutually exclusive:

AFTP Membership (Article VIII Section 1): The committee shall consist of nine elected members. One member shall be elected by the faculty assembly of each major academic division (5), and four members shall be elected at-large by Faculty Conference. All members of the committee must be tenured. While serving on the committee, a faculty member who brings a hearing or grievance matter before the committee or who has been involved in the matter must recuse him/herself from deliberation on that case. Administrative Officers and department chairs shall be ineligible to serve. Administrative Officers, department chairs, and members of the Faculty Personnel committee shall be ineligible to serve on the committee. Eligibility shall be limited to faculty members with tenure.

FP Membership (Article VIII Section 2): The committee shall consist of three members elected at large by the Faculty Conference and one member elected by the faculty assembly of each major academic division. All members of the committee must be tenured. While serving on the committee, a faculty member shall not be eligible for consideration for promotion. Service on the Committee, a constituent faculty assembly's personnel committee, or a department's personnel committee is mutually exclusive. However, if a faculty assembly which includes departmental level review committees is unable to form a departmental personnel committee that includes a sufficient number of tenured members from that department, simultaneous service of not more than one member shall be permissible within the department personnel committee and the parent faculty assembly personnel committee only. Administrative Officers and department chairs shall be ineligible to serve on the committee. Administrative Officers, department chairs, and members of the Academic Freedom, Tenure, and Promotion committee shall be ineligible to serve on the committee.



2. Add the Director of General Education to the General Education Curriculum Committee and as the chair to the General Education Assessment Committee:

GECC Membership (Article X Section 3): Membership shall consist of eleven twelve members: three members from the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, one member from the faculties of each of the other degree-granting colleges and of the Library, a Chair appointed by the Chair of the Academic Council from among the membership of the Academic Council, the Dean of University College, Director of Composition, the Director of HMXP, the CRTW Coordinator, the Director of First-Year Experience, the Director of General Education, and the Registrar or his or her designee. The Chair of the committee, the Dean of University College, the Director of Composition, the Director of HMXP, the CRTW Coordinator, the Director of First-Year Experience, and the Registrar or his or her designee shall be nonvoting members of the committee.

GEAC Membership (Article X Section 4): Membership shall consist of six faculty appointed by the Chief Academic Officer: three members from the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, one member from the faculties of each of the other degree-granting colleges. The Dean of University College, the Director of Composition, the Director(s) of HMXP, the CRTW Coordinator, the Director of First-Year Experience, the Director of General Education, and the Director of Assessment (Division of Academic Affairs) shall be permanent members of this committee. The Director of General Education shall serve as the chair for this committee.



#### Article VII Section 6

In the case in which the Chair of Faculty Conference or Parliamentarian is a candidate in an election, the Secretary of Faculty Conference will replace him/her serve as a witness for that election.

#### Article VIII Section 1

Should the President appoint a designee to act in his or her place during a review of tenure or promotion cases, the appointee must not have already been part of the tenure or promotion decision process.

While serving on the committee, a faculty member who brings a hearing or grievance matter before the committee or who has been involved in the matter must recuse him/herself themselves from deliberation on that case.



#### Article VIII Section 6

The committee shall consist of seven members: one member elected from each of the degree-granting colleges, one member elected by the Graduate Faculty Assembly, a Chair appointed by the Chair of the Academic Council from among the membership of Academic Council, and the Registrar or his or her the Registrar's designee.

The Chair of the committee and the Registrar or his or her the Registrar's designee shall be nonvoting members of the committee.

#### Article VIII Section 9

If, during the committee's existence, any of its non-tenured members gains or is denied tenure, then his/her their membership on the committee will end, and a new replacement made by the above means.

If a non-tenured member of the committee is newly elected to the Academic Council, s/he they will continue as a regular member of the committee while serving as an elected member on Academic Council.



#### Article IX Section 4

No person shall be eligible to serve as a voting member unless he or she has they have served two years as a student at Winthrop University or two years as a faculty member at Winthrop University immediately preceding his or her their service.

#### Article X Section 1

This committee shall have jurisdiction in only two kinds of cases: 1) a case in which a student has accused a faculty member of violating stated course grading policies, and 2) a case in which a student has reason to believe that an error has been made in computing or recording his or her their grade for a particular assignment or for the course.

The committee shall not hear cases in which a student merely believes he or she has they have received unfair treatment.



#### Article X Section 3

Membership shall consist of eleven members: three members from the faculty of the College of Arts and Sciences, one member from the faculties of each of the other degree-granting colleges and of the Library, a Chair appointed by the Chair of the Academic Council from among the membership of the Academic Council, the Dean of University College, Director of Composition, the Director of HMXP, the CRTW Coordinator, the Director of First-Year Experience, and the Registrar or his or her the Registrar's designee.

The Chair of the committee, the Dean of University College, the Director of Composition, the Director of HMXP, the CRTW Coordinator, the Director of First-Year Experience, and the Registrar or his or her the Registrar's designee shall be nonvoting members of the committee.

## Resolution on Academic Freedom and Teaching

- WHEREAS state legislative proposals are being introduced across the United States that target academic discussions of racism and related issues in American history in schools, colleges, and universities;
- WHEREAS Policy 2.2.01 (Academic Freedom and Tenure) of the Policy and Procedure Repository at Winthrop University affirms the importance of academic freedom to the proper functioning of universities, citing the American Association of University Professors'
- 1940 Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and Tenure;
- WHEREAS faculty have responsibility for the curriculum at their university, as stated in the 1940 Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom and Tenure and Winthrop University's own Faculty Conference Bylaws;



- WHEREAS over seventy organizations, including the American Association of University Professors (AAUP) and the Association of American Colleges and Universities (AACU), issued the Joint Statement on Legislative Efforts to Restrict Education about Racism and American History (June 16, 2021) stating their "firm opposition to a spate of legislative proposals being introduced across the country that target academic lessons, presentations, and discussions of racism and related issues in American history in schools, colleges, and universities . . . In higher education, under principles of academic freedom that have been widely endorsed, professors are entitled to freedom in the classroom in discussing their subject. Educators, not politicians, should make decisions about teaching and learning;"
- WHEREAS several states have attempted to prohibit the teaching of concepts characterized as "discriminatory" or "divisive," words which are frequently used in such legislation (South Carolina House Bill 4605), and is indeterminate and based on subjective criteria that are inapposite to the goals of education and the development of essential critical thinking skills; and furthermore, shaping curriculum around such a term hinders faculty in their quest to explore a wide variety of topics;



- WHEREAS educating about systemic barriers to realizing a multiracial democracy based on race or gender should be understood as central to the active pursuit of knowledge in the 21<sup>st</sup> century to produce engaged and informed citizens and a productive, prosperous workforce;
- WHEREAS Winthrop University's mission includes fostering an environment in which "students acquire and develop knowledge, skills, capabilities and values that enrich their lives and prepare them to meet the needs and challenges of the contemporary world, including the ability to communicate effectively, appreciate diversity, work collaboratively, synthesize knowledge, solve complex problems and adapt to change;"
- WHEREAS the University maintains an Office of Diversity & Student Engagement which advocates that "diversity enhances the Winthrop experience for students, faculty, and staff; it is integral to the academic mission and prepares students for global citizenship;"
- WHEREAS in a nation that has for centuries struggled with issues of racial inequity and injustice, many students do not have adequate knowledge of BIPOC and LGBTQI history and the policies that contributed to inequities, Winthrop University has a responsibility and opportunity to help build equity and social justice.



## Resolution

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Faculty
Conference resolutely rejects any attempts by
bodies external to the faculty to restrict or dictate
university curriculum on any matter, including
matters related to racial and social justice, and will
stand firm against encroachment on faculty
authority.

• **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Faculty Conference stands with our K-12 colleagues throughout the country who may be affected by this pernicious legislation when they seek to teach the truth in U.S. history and civics education.

• BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Faculty Conference calls upon its administrators to affirm that they reject any attempts by bodies external to the faculty to restrict or dictate university curriculum on any matter, including matters related to racial and social justice, and will stand firm against encroachment on faculty authority.

#### What is Fresh Check Day?

- A mental health check-in with college students
- Engages students through interactive booths
- Mental health IS health—build a continued culture of wellness

#### Why is Fresh Check Day Important? (JED Foundation Best Practice Approach)

- Suicide: 2<sup>nd</sup> leading cause of death among college students
- 7 out of 10 college students report moderate to serious psychological distress (NCHA, Fall 2021)
- 18-24 years: Average onset for most mental health disorders
- Most students are often unaware of available resources
- Anxiety & Depression: Most prevalent among WU students who access CS

#### How can faculty help?

- Encourage students to maintain daily health and attend FCD
- Connect Fresh Check Day to class activity/syllabus
- Offer extra credit, if possible (can submit a photo of stamped participation card)
- Attend Fresh Check Day yourself!!!
