Dear President Mahony, Provost Boyd, Dean Jones, McNair Advisory Board Members, and Winthrop Community,

Each summer, I write to update the campus on the summer research outcomes of **Winthrop's Ronald E. McNair Scholars**. The tremendous support our program receives from the entire Winthrop community plays a significant role in our students' success. This includes the attendance of staff, faculty, and administrators at the *Winthrop McNair Summer Research Symposium*. Thanks to the excellent work of our students and expertise shared by our faculty Mentors and staff, I am able to continue the tradition of celebrating the accomplishments of the students who complete our McNair Summer research internship.

Eighteen of the thirty-one 2017-18 McNair program participants completed summer research at Winthrop. In addition, three Scholars completed summer research elsewhere (Penn State: Kellie Cooper, EXSC & Eva Owusu, IMCO; Illinois at Urbana-Champaign: Ximena Perez-Velazco, NUTR). The 10 Scholars who graduated this year also completed research (see https://digitalcommons.winthrop.edu/wmrb/ for examples).

Program Context. Winthrop's program is funded to serve 30 undergraduates who meet first-generation and low-income criteria (FG&LI) or who come from underrepresented racial and ethnic backgrounds. At least 2/3^{rds} of students we serve each year must meet the FG&LI criteria. Most programs around the country are funded to serve 25 students. Winthrop University and Winthrop Foundation investments in the program; the widespread support of Winthrop's staff, faculty, and administrators; and the work of our staff and Advisory Board to follow Winthrop's lead regarding fiscal responsibility allow us to consistently serve more students than required. Winthrop was successful in the 2017 grant competition allowing us to support McNair Scholars at Winthrop another five years, through 2023.

Program Objectives. One of the reasons Winthrop was successful in the last grant competition is that we have earned prior experience points for consistently exceeding the first three of the following annual program objectives.

- 96% of participants complete high quality research projects
- 50% of graduates immediately enroll in graduate programs
- 75% of enrollees continue graduate study their second year
- 14% of graduates will earn a PhD within 10 years (to be measured starting 2021)

2018 Summer Scholars' Excellence. In June, Winthrop administrators, faculty, staff, students, alumni, and families showed their support of McNair Scholars by attending the on-campus McNair Summer Research Symposium. Audience discussion and feedback and Mentor guidance helped each Scholar further improve their presentations for the subsequent national competition at the Southeastern Association of Educational Opportunity Program Personnel McNair/SSS Scholars Research Conference in Atlanta. Our 18 students competed in five of seven categories.

Please join me in commending the excellent work of each of the 18 Winthrop McNair Scholars listed below. Please also help me thank the dedicated and knowledgeable faculty mentors who used a significant portion of their summer to support these outstanding students.

Every member of this cohort "brought it" to the competition. This year, so did everyone else. This year's conference was the most competitive I have witnessed. There were significantly more attendees and presenters, and the overall caliber of other schools' presentations was stronger than I've seen at this conference in my nine years. Staff from other programs approached me during the presentations and said things like "Winthrop, we're coming after you this year!" After the conference, a new friend from UNH wrote "It is clear that you all have developed a strong McNair/research culture at Winthrop. Thank you for that influence. I am motivated to help take our program to that next level."

SAEOPP McNair/SSS Research Conference Results. Once again, Winthrop received high praise at the conference, praise for our students' behavior and research, individually and as a cohort. In response, I boasted about the high caliber of undergraduate research experiences Winthrop faculty and resources afford our students.

Three Winthrop oral presentations were recognized during the award ceremony July 1st and are listed below. Two Winthrop McNair Scholars walked away with first place prize checks for \$500. Fellow award winners came from USC (Columbia), Florida, UCLA, UCSB, Cal State Sacramento, Harding, Montevallo, and Alabama @ Birmingham. Only Winthrop earned three or more awards in our five categories.

- 2nd place Social Science Kalea Young-Gibson Dr. Merry Sleigh (Mentor)
- 1st place Social Science Ta'Niss Robinson Dr. Darren Ritzer (Mentor)
- 1st place Life Science Chandani Mitchell Dr. Kathryn Kohl (Mentor)

It's also worth noting that **Ximena Perez-Velazco** received the **Outstanding Poster Presentation** at the Illinois Summer Research Symposium (ISRS) July 20th. Ximena earned 1st place in Health at SAEOPP last year (Dr. Lauren Sastre, Mentor).

The entire Winthrop community shares bragging rights. When asked about the achievements of Winthrop's McNair participants, I praise the broad and deep support our program enjoys within University College; throughout Academic Affairs; by Student Life; and from the offices of Advancement, University Relations, and Business and Finance.
