Re: Celebrating the Winthrop McNair Summer 2019 Researchers

Dear President Mahony, Provost McCormick, Dean Jones, McNair Advisory Board Members, and Winthrop Community,

Over the past week, many Winthrop staff and faculty have asked me "How did the Scholars do at their conference?" I am writing to share that update now. It means a lot to us that our students enjoy this widespread interest and that Winthrop folks from across divisions showed their support by attending or sending regrets for the <u>Symposium</u> last month. The outstanding work of McNair faculty mentors and growing campus support cultivate the mounting accolades our Scholars bring home. This year's cohort of Ronald E. McNair summer research Scholars has the strongest record yet.



Thank you, Dr. Mahony, for coming to the McNair Summer Research Symposium.

Twelve of our thirty-one 2018-19 McNair program participants completed research this summer at Winthrop. In addition, four Scholars are completing summer research elsewhere (Rochester Institute of Technology - Olivia Greathouse; Michigan State - Marlin McKnight; MIT - Juliana Quay; and U Mich - Kalea Young-Gibson). The 10 Scholars who graduated this year also completed research, some of which were presented at <u>SOURCE</u> and some of which will be posted at <u>https://digitalcommons.winthrop.edu/wmrb/</u>.

Program Context. Winthrop's program is funded to serve 30 undergraduates who meet firstgeneration and low-income criteria (FG&LI) or who come from underrepresented racial and ethnic backgrounds. At least 2/3^{rds} of students we serve each year must meet the FG&LI criteria. Most programs around the country are funded to serve 25 students. Winthrop University and Foundation investments in the program; the widespread support of staff, faculty, and administrators; Winthrop's capability to provide high quality undergraduate research experiences; and the work of Dean Jones, our staff, and our Advisory Board to stretch our resources allow us to consistently serve more students than the minimum required. We are currently in our third funding cycle, which runs until September 30, 2023. **Program Objectives.** Winthrop's success in the last two grant competitions was partly due to our earning prior experience points for meeting the first three of our annual program objectives (below).

- 96% of participants complete high quality research projects (97% in last annual report, APR)
- 50% of graduates immediately enroll in graduate programs (50% in last APR)
- 75% of enrollees continue graduate study their second year (100% in last APR)
- 14% of graduates will earn a PhD within 10 years (to be measured starting 2021 APR; so far, we have 4 PhDs, 3 DPTs, and 1 PharmD)

2019 Summer Scholars' Excellence. Scholars used their mentor's guidance and audience feedback from the June 24th symposium to perfect their presentations for the national competition at the Southeastern Association of Educational Opportunity Program Personnel McNair/SSS Scholars Research Conference in Atlanta. Again, Winthrop received high praise at the conference for our students' research and professionalism, individually and as a cohort. Please join me in commending the excellent work of each of the 12 Winthrop McNair Scholars listed below. Please also help me thank the dedicated and knowledgeable faculty mentors who gave a significant portion of their summer to support these outstanding students.

Winthrop students are stellar. Each year, I think that summer's cohort is the strongest we have had. This year was no different. I was particularly excited to bring this group to the conference and watch them represent the University. Every member of this cohort brought positive recognition to the university. While Winthrop brought fewer students this year than ever before, this year's meeting had the largest number of competitors in its 25 years (204: 150 oral presentations, 54 posters). Furthermore, the overall quality continues to improve and, this year, our competition was the strongest I have seen. That makes the number of awards Winthrop's McNair Scholars received that much more impressive. What's more, after awards were announced, a fellow McNair Director told me that her Scholars told her they want to explore Winthrop graduate programs if this is the kind of research our undergraduates conduct.

SAEOPP McNair/SSS Research Conference Results. Five Winthrop presenters earned awards and cash prizes. I believe this is more than any other institution. Our Scholars competed in posters and four oral categories with students from universities all over the country including, but not limited to, Georgia Tech, Austin Peay, Rider, and the Universities of Florida, Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, UCLA, and New Orleans.
