Of the Life Science oral presentations, Jordan Lewis (Mentor: Dr. Matt Heard) earned third place and Kyle McDaniel (Mentor: Dr. Julian Smith, III) earned second place. In the Education oral presentation category, Ashley Causey (Mentor: Dr. Jeannie Haubert) earned first place. These outstanding students earn more than a line on their vitae by placing. These awards come with cash prizes (\$500 for first place).

Please take a moment to congratulate all 18 of Winthrop's McNair Scholars and their Mentors for their excellent work during an intense summer program.
