I. Approval of Minutes (approved by E-mail)

II. Chair's Remarks (Laura Glasscock for Jo Koster)

- A. Dr. Glasscock thanked the outgoing council members: Bettie Parsons Berger, Marguerite Doman, Adam Glover, Shawna Helf, Ximena Perez-Velasco, and Jo Koster.
- B. She welcomed the newly-elected members beginning in 2019-2020: Danko Tarabar (CBA), Wendy Sellers (CAS), Brad Witzel (COE), and Dustin Hoffman (CAS). The VPAA appointed member and the new chair of the CSL will also join AC in August 2019.

III. Remarks from the Provost and Executive Vice President of Academic Affairs (Debra Boyd)

Dr. Boyd gave out an executive summary regarding the General Education Core review. The committee reviewed data not only from Winthrop but from other institutions. It determined that the classes were not the issue, but rather than transfer process. **See handout.** [I do not have the electronic version at present but will attach it to the minutes when I do.]

She indicated that some offices are not open and warm in working with transfer students. We want this to be a uniform experience for our transfer process. We want to speed up the process of evaluating transcripts and we need to figure out a way to have them done within 48 hours. Transfer students need to know where they stand as they try to make a decision about coming here.

Dr. Boyd talked about restructuring pre-reqs: esp. HMXP and CRTW and removal of 75-hour rule. *[Students who do not pass these courses with grades of C- or better by the time they have completed 75 earned hours will be limited to a maximum course load of 12 hours per semester and will not be permitted to enroll in courses above 299 until they have satisfied these requirements.]*

She also mentioned hybrid HMXP and CRTW sections for transfer students bringing in more than 60 hours and analyzing transfer courses and how they meet WU programs. This is complicated with the writing requirement [for Gen Ed courses].

Dr. Boyd stated that new faculty orientation would be a good time to help faculty understand the importance of Gen Ed. She has heard from students that Winthrop doesn't make it clear as to why these are important. The bottom line is that these courses are vital and critical. It's about how we address the transfer issue.

Mr. Tslentis asked Dr. Boyd how she would envision this coming together. Dr. Boyd responded that we do not have a committee for this. We need someone to spearhead this. It's not intended to be focused in the English department. Courses should be interdisciplinary.

Dr. Lipscomb commented that this [critical thinking skills] is what employers want.

Dr. Boyd remarked that this set of skills can be the difference between remaining in a job and moving up. Our university level competencies focus on what employers want: problem solving and critical thinking.

Dr. Disney noted that what makes Winthrop unique is our work with critical thinking, diversity and inclusion. She is glad for this recommendation.

Dr. Garrison asked what the next steps were.

Dr. Boyd replied that some are already underway. The curriculum part has to go through the faculty governance. Administrative things are being worked on. The website will have to wait on the new web CMS (Content Management System). There are already conversations about the new faculty mentoring program. Folks in University College are working on things to push out to all faculty.

Dr. Glasscock said we should be talking with our departments about pre-req issues.

Dr. Boyd said that we don't want these to be barriers for our students.

IV. Remarks from the Chair of the Council of Student Leaders (Ximena Perez-Valazco)

Ms. Perez-Valazco said she has realized how student-centered the work we do is and thanked the council members. She then introduced the new president, Imani Belton.

She then spoke of student concerns:

1. Students would like the S/U deadline extended. They felt like there were not enough grading assignments by the deadline to determine whether they should elect the S/U.

2. Students would like a financial literacy class. A lot of first-generation college students aren't having these conversations at home in terms of student loans as well as student employment. They would support either making this a mandatory class or having it a part of ACAD.

Dr. Boyd shared that students don't know what indebtedness means. She encouraged Winthrop to have such a financial literacy course as part of the curriculum or a competency requirement.

Dr. Doman mentioned that FINC 111 [Financial Literacy-1credit] is offered in the College of Business, but said it being a part of ACAD was a good idea.

Ms. Perez-Valazco mentioned her conversations with Dr. Phillip Gibson (COB). She talked about the level of spending outside of school—wants vs. needs.

She also spoke about the CSL starting a new initiative of Town Hall Tuesday. It is a once-a-semester meeting for open grievances. They had representatives from several offices (Financial Aid, Campus Police...) and had a good turnout. (It was a Cultural Event). She would like to see representatives from the academic side. They get questions like, "Why do I have to take this class? Why is there a lab fee?"

Ms. Perez-Valazco said that CSL is considering a change to the by-laws: adding a commuter chair to CSL as well as an international chair. She has an idea of a veteran and/or post-traditional on CSL as well.

Dr. Disney asked for clarification on "chair" and Ms. Perez-Valazco explained that there are student representatives for each of the largest groups. Adding a new chair requires a constitutional change. Then there are elected representatives.

Dr. Boyd reminded everyone that just because faculty conference approves this [new programs] doesn't mean they can be offered immediately. Some have to go to SACS and CHE. She mentioned that if some of these had come through in the fall, we may have been able to get these available this fall.

Dr. Glasscock asked where programs go after Faculty Conference. Dr. Boyd replied that they come to her office. They have to make sure it's viable. Then there's the collaboration with departments in getting materials ready for CHE/SACS. SACS is now down to two deadlines. She mentioned that we're still waiting on BPS [Bachelor of Professional Studies] which we submitted by their deadline. Mr. Druke talked about the different deadline dates.

Dr. Lipscomb asked about the viability issue being added to the CAS. Mr. Druke indicated it was being worked on and will be available for any new programs going forward.

Dr. Garrison asked how this is communicated to departments--approvals and what is next. Mr. Druke has been communicating with departments and have so early on in the process.

Dr. Boyd said this often starts as a conversation in her office. It helps to troubleshoot.

C. Technology Requirement (Jason Tselentis) (see attachment)

Mr. Tselentis and his committee were asked to look at Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs) and transferability. They considered the question, “Could some students test out of the technology requirement?” For the most part, they determined that the SLOs were fine. There was some language changed. They did question using two forms.

Technology courses **must have technology use, management, and/or examination as a primary educational focus and they** should address the following learning objectives ~~and criteria for inclusion.~~

There are 6 criteria involved in determining if a class fulfills the technology requirement for general education at Winthrop University. A class or group of classes meeting the technology requirement must have technology as a primary educational focus and must **meet the first two criteria**. Recognizing that programs are encouraged to meet this requirement in the major, the technology focus may be discipline specific. A class must meet a minimum of 2 of the 4 remaining requirements to meet the general education curriculum requirements.

- Advance students’ abilities to **use, manage, and examine the impact of** technology—such as computing, digital tools, digital information, and digital operations, among others—as ~~it~~ relates to Digital Citizenship. **Digital Citizenship includes analyzing the appropriateness of online resources, assessing the positive and/or negative impact(s) of technology, using digital tools in ethical and responsible ways, internet and digital safety and security, and management of one’s professional and personal digital footprint.** ~~Digital Citizenship encompasses areas such as analyzing the appropriateness of online resources, impact of technology in a professional setting, ethical and responsible use of digital tools’ Internet and digital safety, and management of one’s professional and personal digital footprint.~~
- Advance the student’s understanding and ability to think computationally. Computational Thinking is the process of formulating a problem, finding a solution (or solutions) to the problem, expressing it in such a way that humans or machines can understand the solution

The transferability/test out may be need to be reviewed by another committee. Testing out would be a challenge.

A. The Seven educational goals listed in the Gen Ed section of the catalog (Ms. Jones on behalf of Dr. Gloria Jones)

Ms. Jones stated that Dr. Jones questioned why we had these education goals listed in the catalog.

Dr. Boyd indicated that these were old goals mapped to the Gen Ed. They drove the competencies but can't really be assessed. She mentioned that as we face accreditation issues, these would be confusing to accrediting bodies. She would be ok with their being moved somewhere else.

Dr. Glasscock clarified whether we needed to vote on removing them from the catalog. Mr. Drueke said yes.

Dr. Abernathy thought the Gen Ed committee would be supportive of this. She agreed they were confusing.

Dr. Boyd said she was certain they were no longer assessed.

Dr. Lipscomb asked, "If these were eliminated, would anything be lost?"

Dr. Boyd said there may be some that say, "Yes."

Dr. Hayes said there was a recognition of the key values of those goals, but they were impossible to realize. There was no sense they had dropped something critical with the ULCs.

Mr. Tslenis asked if this was something students or parents can understand. Do we understand it? There are two audiences: internal and external. There are risks for removing it.

Dr. Disney thinks maybe it's about the order of things.

Mr. Drueke asked about the catalog used for the next SACS reaccreditation. Dr. Boyd said it would be the 2020-21 edition. She suggested we look at ULCs documents and whether these goals were still a part of that.

Dr. Glasscock recommended that we hold off and re-evaluate in the fall. The consensus was to flip the goals and ULCs in the catalog.

B. Election of Chair for 2019-20

Dr. Glasscock asked for nominations for chair. There was silence. Dr. Boyd asked why there was fear about this position. The amount of work was cited.

Mr. Drueke said the chair had the support of himself and Ms. Jones.

Dr. Disney was nominated. She had a concern about diversity since the new chair as well as the former chair of Faculty Conference are in the Political Science department.

Dr. McLaine nominated Dr. Costner citing his attention to detail.

Dr. Costner accepted and was approved by acclamation.
