

ACHIEVING WRITING COMPETENCY

In the new program, there are currently eight (8) General Education courses that have writing components. To ensure that all students in each of these courses have a comparable experience, we recommend that the courses include the following:

REQUIREMENTS FOR A COURSE WITH A WRITING COMPONENT

Evaluated Assignments

A course with a writing component will require either a single paper or combination of assignments consisting of eight (8) pages of evaluated writing or at least four (4) of the following assignments. Length of these assignments is left to the discretion of the instructor, as is the number from any single category; but the goal is to require significant writing opportunities. Categories indicate similarities in assignments only. One of the four assignments may be collaborative.

Electronic Communication occurs in both **Evaluated Assignments** and **Non-Evaluated Assignments** since many instructors require students to participate in on-line class discussion groups or on-line journals. This participation may constitute part of the student's grade. Other faculty may have students email questions about assignments, class meetings, etc. This correspondence probably is not evaluated, even though it constitutes writing for information.
