This month's review is by Whitney Hough, director of communications and community engagement, College of Visual and Performing Arts.



One of the most anticipated thrillers of the year, "The Girl on the Train," was released in theaters this past October. I was intrigued by the trailer back in April and wanted to read the popular book that inspired the movie. Surprisingly, I read the entire book in just a couple of days, and as I turned the last page, I knew I'd have to sleep with a light on that night. It had the perfect combination of thrill, suspense and surprise that makes a page-turner.

I was so excited to see the movie that my husband and I bought tickets for opening night. We walked into the theater, popcorn in hand, ready for a thrill. Unfortunately, I found the movie lacked the suspense that I hoped for. The movie has received middling reviews, splitting critics and audiences alike. However, most agree that Emily Blunt's performance as Rachel is gripping and entertaining. The screenplay sticks pretty close to the story you already know, besides a few fairly insignificant changes, one of which is the

setting of the story. Most people who find out that the movie is set in New York versus the book's location of London are confused by the change, but it really has minimal effect on the story. In fact, Blunt uses her native British accent to further emphasize the fact that she is the outsider in this story.

I was disappointed that many of the twists from the book were mentioned casually with no build up at all in the movie. Was that because I knew the twists that were coming? Possibly. But my husband who had never read the novel said he never felt on the edge of his seat. You can tell that the story was influenced by "Gone Girl," a much more successful "whodunit"-style thriller released in 2014.

Overall, I think the movie will appeal to its target audience. The movie is not bad by any means, but I doubt it will be nominated for any Oscars this upcoming awards season. Grab your popcorn and sit back for a fun yet somewhat predictable Saturday night thrill.



## In Loving Memory


