MAKE OPEN ENROLLMENT CHANGES WITH MYBENEFITS

The most efficient way to make your coverage changes during Open Enrollment is the online process on the MyBenefits website. *MyBenefits* ensures a speedy transmission of information regarding coverage changes. Employees should see page 2 of *Benefits Advantage* for information about creating an account and using your MyBenefits account. MyBenefits will be available for open enrollment changes beginning Oct. 1, 2015. **Open Enrollment changes can be made until 11:59 p.m.on October 31, 2015. **

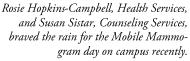
MORE PINK stuff

getting to know

This month's spotlight is on the Winthrop Men's and Women's Soccer Coaching Staff. The Women's Coaching Staff consists of Head Coach Spencer Smith and Associate Head Coach Johnathan Brabson. The Men's Coaching Staff consists of Head Coach Rich Posipanko and Associate Head Coach Daniel Ridenhour.

How long have you been coaching at Winthrop?

Spencer has been at Winthrop for six years after he coached men's soccer at Radford. Johnathan has been here nine years and he coached at Queens before arriving in Rock Hill.

Rich has been at Winthrop for 27 years, as he coached at Longwood before his stint at Winthrop. Daniel has been at Winthrop for 12 years, after a stint at Georgia State.

What is the hardest part about being a Coach?

The women's soccer staff both agreed it was getting the entire team on the same page on the same day. Daniel said it was recruiting athletes in today's culture. He stated that athletes have been coddled and given recognition without putting in any work. Rich said wearing different hats, such as being an academic coach, a parental figure, and counselor to his athletes.

What is the most enjoyable part about being a Coach?

Johnathan and Spencer stated it was the flexibility, being outside and seeing your team come together and seeing improvement.

The men's soccer staff said teaching their athletes leadership skills, building character and life lessons during their time as their coaches.



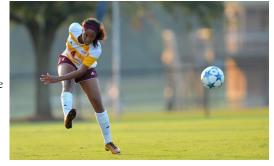

How do you prepare for the upcoming season?

The women's soccer staff stated that they talk about the goals for the team in the upcoming season; try to recruit the right players and trying to get the best athletes available.

Preparing for the season, Daniel draws up training schedules for his athletes and also what skills to practice. He also takes time to spend with his wife and four children since he knows when the season starts his time will be limited.

"The program and preparation never ends," Rich says, "this is a year-round program. In May and June, you have some downtime, but in July, you start to plan out the upcoming season and in August the athletes return and practices start."



Since this is Rich's last season here at Winthrop, we asked Spencer and Daniel for their best "Gaff" story.

Spencer told a story that happened when he was still coaching at Radford. Radford had just put a new building out at the soccer facility. When Winthrop came to play, he had put a sign on one of the doors that said "Rich Posipanko." He told Rich it was his office to use while he was there. When Rich opened the door, it was the Men's restroom. Spencer added, "There are so many stories, but you can't print all of them."

Daniel shared that when he started his coaching position, Rich had told everyone that the new coach's name is Dan Ridenhour. A few weeks later, another staff member came to Daniel and told him the staff thought he was rude. When he asked why, he was told everyone says, "Hi Dan!" and you never respond. Daniel then stated that he had never been called Dan in his life and he didn't realize people were speaking to him. He also

didn't notice that the name plate on his door had Dan Ridenhour; it has since been changed to Daniel.



We asked Rich what he would miss the most about coaching: "I will miss the players and the off-field relationships that I have developed with my players." Rich is very well respected by his alumni; many of them come back to visit him when they are in the area and also seek him out for advice. I am sure that his current players and alumni will miss him as much as the Athletic Staff will miss him.

I have been working at Winthrop for seven years, as of October 16. I started in Health & Counseling Services and worked there



for two and a half years, and then moved to Athletics. My current job consists of the administrative duties for Men's & Women's Cross Country/Track, Men's & Women's Soccer, Lacrosse, Sports Information, Strength & Conditioning and Athletic Training, as well as taking care of all the athletic injury insurance claims.
