

Lori Tuttle joined Winthrop University as the Executive Director for Alumni Relations and Annual Giving in March 2015. She serves as the chief operating officer for the Winthrop Alumni Association and works closely with the executive board and the university's more than 50,000 alumni, coordinating communications, affinity group activities, class reunions and annual events such as Homecoming and Reunion Weekend. She also oversees Annual Giving in the Office of Institutional Advancement, which is a key revenue source for student scholarships, the alumni association, faculty awards and other university initiative. Prior to joining Winthrop, Lori worked at The Citadel Foundation in Charleston, SC as Director of Development for An-

nual and Reunion giving from 2009-2015. Prior to being at Winthrop she served as Director of Operations and Capital Campaign Assistant with Custom Development Solutions, Inc., a capital campaign consulting firm in Charleston. She earned a Master of Public Administration with a concentration in arts management from the College of Charleston and a B.A. in sociology with a minor in communications from Mercer University in Macon, Georgia.
