



Recent Highlights




- When study abroad trips needed to be cancelled due to the pandemic, International Center staff members provided assistance to study abroad students with the logistics of traveling home, coordinated the academic needs of students unable to complete their coursework overseas, and negotiated refunds from both semester-long study abroad partners and short-term faculty-led program partners.
- Staff have served as liaisons with the U.S. Department of State and U.S. Department of Homeland Security, in addition to working with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services and the Student Exchange Visitor Program to keep on top of changes.
- Staff have hosted virtual town halls, Q&A sessions, and informational sessions with study abroad students, international students, and on-campus partners to keep everyone in the loop on immigration and COVID-19 issues such as access to embassies, student visas, travel restrictions, and more.
- Staff have continued to support Winthrop's international community by providing non-resident taxation support to international students abroad; responding to the immigration needs and applications of current and new full-time international faculty and staff; and assisting international students as they plan to return to campus with international travel, quarantine, housing, health and safety, immigration matters, visa issuance, academic support, and more.
- Staff have been managing and coordinating the University's recertification and redesignation processes to retain the ability to host our international student population.











The International Center is extremely grateful to the innumerable staff colleagues across campus who have supported both international and study abroad students during these turbulent times. In addition to the existing rentention efforts, the fall 2020 semester will also include:

- Virtual study abroad courses for students whose fall 2020 programs were suspended
- Immigration, academic, and personal support for Winthrop's international students
- A virtual study abroad fair that includes global options for all Winthrop students
- Virtual global engagement through Casual Fridays and the Global Friends Conversation Partner Program
- International Education Week
