






Are you looking for a way to get involved in the Rock Hill community? Here are three easy ways to get connected and make a difference:

Rock Hill Reads is an early literacy initiative that focuses on reading to groups of children between birth and age 8 in non-traditional locations. They are seeking adults to become certified readers for groups of children, especially in the Saluda Corrider.

Bike Mentoring supports middle school aged children with community based mentors that utilize the bike facilities in our community. Adult mentors a.k.a. "Bigs" meet with students a.k.a. "Littles" two to four times a month.

Workforce Development provides underemployed individuals with developmental opportunities to broaden their skillset and gain employment exceeding livable wage standards. There are weekly mentoring check-ins, one-day a month training, and enrollment in a specialized program.
