I work in the community to provide hundreds of students annually with the opportunity to transition from secondary seamlessly postsecondary education (and I always remind them, whether they are with us for one semester or earn a Bachelor's degree, they will forever be a part of the WU Fam). Our Teacher Cadets Program is part of a national model to encourage academically talented high school students with exemplary interpersonal skills to pursue a career in teaching/ educational leadership. WU was the first college in 1985 to offer transferrable college credit for students taking this course, and what an honor it is to support the instructors and students who are the next generation of educators! Our Bridge Program is a partnership with York Technical College for students to earn their associate's degree prior to transferring to WU to earn their bachelor's degree. This past spring, I had the opportunity of cheering on my first

Bridge cohort as they graduated from Winthrop—that moment is why I do this work. Lastly, our Dual Enrollment Program has a special place in my heart. We provide high school students with the opportunity to get a jump-start on their college degrees, identify areas of interest, and increase the likelihood of graduating from high school and enrolling in college.

What is your favorite part of Winthrop?

I love cheering on the WU Eagles; attending cultural events, guest lectures, and the Rock Hill Christmas Parade; and my latest obsession is the smoothies in the Eagle Eatery.

What do you do in your spare time? Hobbies?

I like to spend time with my family hiking, cooking, and adventuring across the Carolinas. We are new to the south, and always looking for new activities and sites to see.

If you had to tell an incoming student one thing about Winthrop, what would it be?

At Winthrop, you aren't just a number—you are a member of the inclusive Eagle Family dedicated to supporting you as you receive an exceptional education and innovative overall experience. Honoring a Winthrop Icon

Dorothy "Dot" Barber has been a Winthrop icon since she stepped foot on campus 52 years ago. Based on Archives' records, she is the longest serving employee in Winthrop's history and one of the first full time African American employees at the university.

As she prepares to enjoy her retirement this month, Dot graciously took a few moments to reminisce with us about her Winthrop experience.

How did you come to work and be involved with Winthrop?

I obtained the job through a job finding service. I was to start another job on the same day I was called for an interview at Winthrop, but, thankfully, chose Winthrop.

What are some of the biggest changes or events you've seen at Winthrop over the years?

Technology. We went from no computers where we communicated directly with each other to now, communicating mostly by computers; the interaction and communication directly with the students; new and improved buildings on and around campus. Fashion has also changed—in the beginning females were restricted to wearing dresses and skirts.

What was it like to be one of the first African Americans to hold a professional position at Winthrop?

I didn't think about it as being one of the first African Americans. I don't recall any negative comments or gestures. Everyone seemed to be very accepting but a little curious as to how we would fit in.

The other first African American was Ellen Owens who started work the same day I did. We worked in different departments, but we were always together and supported each other. We didn't consider ourselves as being the first African Americans to hold a professional position at Winthrop, but we were just thankful to have a job.

How have you seen things change since then?

There's been some improvements and changes in many areas. Each year and each generation brings a different and unique experience and change.

What made you want to stay with Winthrop for so long?

Winthrop has been like a second home. I am truly thankful for having had the opportunity to work, communicate, and interact with so many wonderful students and employees. Winthrop gave me a purpose, a job I loved learning and doing, and a sense of belonging.

What are some of your favorite Winthrop memories?

One of my favorite Winthrop memories was the Fulfilling the Promise celebration where we were recognized with the first African American Students to attend and to graduate from Winthrop. My most favorite memories were spent with my Dacus Library family. We had some of the most amazing student and staff gatherings and activities that I will always treasure.

Brittany Pigford says you hired her in the library when she was a freshman 17 years ago. What do you remember from her early days at Winthrop?

I didn't actually interview her, but I did her hiring paperwork, etc. She was very polite and had a million-dollar smile. I also noticed she had what I call a "frisky" and unique walk.


