

Let Printing Services Help with Your Holiday Cards and Gifts!

Each December, Printing Services loves helping our colleagues by printing their family holiday cards and holiday newsletters. But, this year, we can also help you with gifts as well! We have new equipment that allows us to make custom shirts, cups, mugs, keychains, stickers and more. Prices vary depending on the specifics of the job (e-mail <u>printingservices@winthrop.edu</u>, if you'd like a personalized quote), but as an example, custom t-shirts are \$20 each. If you provide the blank shirt then they are only \$15. If Printing Services is providing the shirt or cup, we will need time to order them, so please place your orders in early December.

But back to the holiday cards and letters. Everyone loves getting mail and just think how you can brighten the days of your friends and family by sending them. Again, the pricing can vary, but as an example, if you want 50 copies of a personalized, 5x7, flat holiday card, the cost is just \$17.20 if you provide the artwork. Add 50 blank envelopes for just \$4.08. If you want Printing Services to save you a ton of time and address those envelopes for you, the cost for the printed and addressed envelopes is just \$24.94.
