Jackie Concodora director, Health & Counseling Services Faculty/Staff Ombuds

I started at Winthrop in February 2013 as the director of Health and Counseling Services. I have a collateral role as ombuds

- since I continue to serve as the HCS director. My professional
 background is a clinical mental health counselor and supervisor
 where I worked in public mental health and private practice
- with people who experienced mental health conditions ranging from severe psychiatric symptoms to normal issues affecting one's daily functioning and wellbeing. I thrive on empowering others
- to accomplish their goals. I enjoy working with people but do enjoy alone time to recharge. Aside from caring for my family,
- my passions revolve around working with my hands through gardening/growing plants, and other creative activities with a range of mediums.

What is an ombuds?

- An ombuds is an institutional resource to campus employees who follows the International Ombuds Association ethical standards
- of confidentiality, independence, impartiality/neutrality, and informality. The ombuds protects the identity and confidential information shared but is obligated by law to disclose information

if there is an imminent risk of serious harm. The ombuds functions independently of formal channels (like HR) and other campus services. An ombuds will not take sides and is an available resource to all employees. Ombuds do not participate in formal processes like investigations, legal processes, or grievances, nor do they retain permanent records of communications. Speaking with an ombuds is always off the record and does not constitute notice to the institution.

What does the role do?

- Provides active listening to questions and concerns off the record
- Helps identify other university resources to address an issue or concern
- Explore ways to engage with and evaluate a range of options for problem resolution
- Provides information on university processes and policies
- Offers issue, conflict, and negotiation coaching
- Share systemic concerns and trends to the institution in a confidential manner

What does the role not do

- Receive notice of claims against Winthrop University
- Conduct investigations
- Make management decisions or policy
- Advocate for or take sides for individuals or groups
- Substitute for formal channels
- Testify or produce documents in legal or other proceedings

What can staff expect when meeting with an ombuds?

At the initial meeting before addressing the concern or issue that brought the visitor to me, I will explain my role, including the ethical standards that I follow. I will listen to the visitor and ask clarifying questions to ensure that I understand their situation. Each circumstance is unique and I work to empower the visitor to develop a plan of action as relevant to their circumstance in a safe environment.

Does an ombuds give advice?

No. This is a common misconception of the role, because visitors are often upset and want to be told what to do for quick relief of their distress. I help visitors identify and process through options and which strategies they feel most comfortable using. Telling a visitor what to do undermines their self-determination.

Is the ombuds part of HR?

No. This is an independent role that reports directly to the president. HR does refer employees to the ombuds office.

Will the ombuds share my information?

No. All communications remain confidential unless permission is provided to share specific information, as appropriate. The ombuds is looking for trends to identify areas for systemic change and issue prevention.

Can I e-mail my concerns to the ombuds?

E-mail is not secure so it is not a confidential method of communication. Visitors should restrict use of e-mail to scheduling appointments only.


