Stolle received a BA in Visual Arts from Framingham State College, and completed studies at Richmond College (London, England) and Massachusetts College of Art (Boston, MA).

December 10, 2018 – March 8, 2019 Frankie Flood

Frankie Flood is an Associate Professor and area head of the Metalsmithing and Jewelry Design area at Appalachian State University in Boone, North Carolina. Flood previously served as Director of the Digital Craft Research Lab at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee, and for eleven years served various roles in the Department of Art such as Director of Foundations, area head of the Jewelry and Metalsmithing program, and Coordinator for the BA in Digital Fabrication and Design. Flood is a graduate of the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign, where he received his Master of Fine Art degree in Metalsmithing.

Frankie Flood's interest in machines and tools and the influence of his working class upbringing is a source of inspiration for the functional objects that he creates. Flood exhibits his work nationally and internationally and his work has received many awards and has been published widely. The potential that Craft has to serve local and global communities through design and fabrication has been the focus of Flood's recent research as he continues to combine traditional craft practice with digital technology. His recent research regarding 3D printed prosthetics and one of a kind adaptive devices has spread worldwide and his creation of the Digital Craft Research Lab has created new areas of study for students interested in digital fabrication.

<u>Arts in Basic Curriculum Project – Christine Fisher</u>

- The ABC Project added five schools and one district as ABC Sites this June. We now have 170,730
 Students / 84 schools and district ABC Sites in SC
- Funding for the additional sites was possible by an extra \$100,000 the SC Arts Commission received from the legislature for arts education initiatives.

- The second annual Arts Higher Education Forum was held on May 17, 2018, at USC. There was much discussion and intense dialog during the forum. Presenters for the forum were:
 - Melanie Barton, the Executive Director of the SC Education Oversight Committee: Presentation on EOC K – 12 Education Initiatives and the Teacher Shortage
 - Dr. Falicia Harvey, Director, Center for Teaching Excellence and Dr. John Lane, Director of Academic Affairs from the SC Commission on Higher Education: Presentation on SC Teacher Shortage followed by open dialogue
 - Jane Turner, the Executive Director of CERRA: A discuss and open dialogue about new data on the arts teacher shortage, new assistance for students wanting to major in art, music, dance or theatre education, additional loan forgiveness programs, access to additional forgiveness programs.
 - Carrie Power, Education Associate for the Visual and Performing Arts, will unpack the South Carolina College- and Career-Ready Standards for Visual and Performing Arts Proficiency with Design in Mind.
- ABC Also gave participants a book on design to assist students with the new visual and performing arts standards (which include design.)
- The tentative date for the next forum is January 25, 2019, and hosted by the College of Visual and Performing Arts at Winthrop University.
- Last year at this time, the ABC Project was finishing the search for the new ABC Field Services Specialist. The amazing Kim Wilson was hired and started last October. She is a Winthrop graduate, and amazing artist, educator and all around great person. If you haven't gotten to know her....You are missing out!
