

The Logic of an Article

1)	The main purpose of this article is a. (State as accurately as possible the author's purpose for writing the article.)
2)	The key question that the author addresses is a. (Figure out the key question, problem, or issue in the mind of the author when he or she wrote the article.)
3)	The most important information in this article is a. (Identify the facts, experiences, evidence, and data the author uses to support his or her conclusions.)
4)	The main inferences/conclusions in this article are a. (Identify the key conclusions the author draws and presents in the article. One important conclusion is framed as an assertion and is located in the article's thesis statement.)
5)	The key concept(s) we need to understand in this article is (are) By these concepts the author means a. (Figure out the most important ideas you would have to understand in order to grasp the author's line of reasoning.)
6)	The main assumption(s) underlying the author's thinking is (are) a. (Figure out what the author is takes for granted in his or her argument. What must be true in order for other claims or conclusions to be true? What is a "given" in the argument?)
7)	If we take this line of reasoning seriously, the implications are a. (What consequences are likely to follow if people take the author's line of reasoning seriously?)
8)	If we fail to take this line of reasoning seriously, the implications are a. (What consequences are likely to follow if people ignore the author's reasoning?
9)	The main point(s) of view presented in this article is (are) a. (What is the author's stance, position, etc.? What perspectives are shared or are evident in the article?)
