If the prompt asks you to:

- 1. Define
 - a. Specify and detail the meaning, characteristics, identify limits, or place into a category. <u>DON'T craft an argument or discuss subjectivity.</u>
- 2. Compare & Contrast
 - a. Consider and analyze similarities or differences. DON'T do one without the other.
- 3. Analyze
 - a. Break it down into parts to gain insight and examine it closely and in detail. <u>DON'T give a</u> summary or description.
- 4. Explain
 - a. Give the facts and theories objectively, provide reasons, causes, effects, implications, and ramifications. DON'T craft an argument around an explanation if the prompt only calls for you to explain.
- 5. *List Cause and Effect*
 - a. Analyze events or occurrences and what happened as a result. <u>DON'T focus on summarizing; focus on evaluating.</u>
- 6. Discuss
 - a. Explain and loot at the topic in detail. Sometimes this also requires some comparisons. DON'T argue for or analyze one point of view; be objective.
- 7. Summarize
 - a. Simplify the topic to its main points, elements, or steps. <u>DON'T just give a detailed</u> description.
- 8. Evaluate
 - a. Make a judgement about the significance or value and support with evidence. <u>DON'T</u> <u>simply explain, summarize, or compare without taking a position</u>; while evaluation often incorporates explanation or summary, evaluation calls for a value judgement.
- 9. *Identify*
 - a. Name, indicate, and specify. <u>DON'T take an argumentative position unless the prompt specifically calls for it.</u>
